For starter voters "Did Not" over turn "Domestic Partnerships," Prop 8, dealt with same sex marriage, that what was overturned.

My husband Jorge and I were united in Domestic Partnership on Nov. 13, 2008, at which time my name was "legally" changed from Castello to Morgan, by the Secretary of the state of California

Debra Bowen. [I have all the documents should you wish to view them at another interview].

Now under Family Code 297.5 [In part] Registered domestic Partners shall have the same rights, protections and benefits, and shall be subject to the same responsibilities, obligations and duties under law, whether they derive from status, administrative regulations, court rules, government policies, common law or any other provisions or sources of law, as are granted to and imposed upon spouses.

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With this in mind Jorge and I have the right and the benefit of calling ourselves married.

My husband and I have never been incarcerated at DVI Prison in Tracy at the same time. We met at Mule Creek State Prison in Eureka, California where we lived in the same cell and it was in that cell (12-137) that we fell in love and started build the bond that we now share and makes our hearts unseperatable.

The only two connections between DVI, my husband and I, are one his mother Inlay (my mother) Carmen Martinez visited Jorge while he was at DVI because I wasn't allowed due to being on parole. The other is I was there to pick my husband up the day he was released and the first thing I did was to reslip our wedding ring back on his finger, a ring that symbolizes to us a life of love, loyalty, faithfulness and devotion to each other.

Law enforcement and the D.A. both have simillure goals to lock up offenders.

Jail Classification has made it a habit to seperate certain co-defendants, which assists the D.A. in obtaining a conviction because the co-defendants are unable to work together.

I have court transcripts of our case in the Judges Chamber, where the D.A. uses our love for each other and our marriage as reasons to keep us apart. [Will show at interview]

I also have transcripts where the classification Lumentant states that Jorge and I are not in danger of each other, but possibly of other inmates

In your story you failed to mention a very important fact. Jorge and I have decided to remain in Ad-seg, if the KSF order was removed we still wouldn't have contact at the

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Jail with each other or other inmates, below will show you how its a sexual bias

1) Ad-seg is single cell, so we'd live alone

2) we'd go to yard alone

3) we'd be escorted alone

4) We'd be on the bus together or with other inmates with our classification in the protective caddes

5) We'd be together in the court holding cells

6) We would never come in direct contact with any inmates that arent our classification

7) We'd be in court with each other, no other inmates.

It is obvious they only want to maintain our seperation because they think we want to have sex, which by the way is the furthest thing in our mind at this time.

As for Jail staff, their hatred and distasteful attitude towards gay inmates, mainly Jorge and I because were married is easy seen by there looks and comments.

For example, during our last interview they searched my cell found an old booking photo that I had in a folder. Instead of just taking it the officer showed it to all his partners where they laughed and joked about it.

My husband Jorge has been asked inappropriate questions by staff about our sex life.

The list goes on.

There you it Mr. Smith do as you will. And also should you print this story you will be receiving a letter very soon with the name of the person who took our friend Cindy's life, a person that will never be forgotten by either me or my husband.
